

Week 2 – Holy Love

Example Questions

We want your group to generate questions that are relevant to your group. To tackle questions and issues that are sources of confusion and opportunities for growth for *your* students.

******At one point in this video David Platt seems to suggest that because God is holy, we must trust that evil is within God’s plan—that evil is something that exists so that evil might contrast goodness. But this begs the question of whether God needs evil to reveal his goodness or whether evil is simply the result of free-will—does evil have to exist for good to exist? Around CSF we believe that God does not author evil or plan it, but that he does redeem it when the choices of man bring it about.

Confusion: Wait. God isn’t a person. Or even a being. What does it mean that Isaiah “saw the Lord” and why is the image so weird?

Thinking: In Luke 5 we see these fishermen almost miraculously catch a large amount of fish when they follow Jesus’ command. What can this passage teach us about who Jesus is?

Being: What can we learn for Peter in Luke 5? What does he realize, and how is that is an essential part of our character as a disciple?

Doing: In Luke 5, we see Peter and the other disciples give up everything to follow Jesus. How do we replicate this in our lives while still remaining committed to the place God has us now (i.e. school)?

Going: Like Isaiah in verse 8, we need to make ourselves available to “go”. What does this look like on a college campus?
