Week 3 – Sacrificial Love Example Questions

We want your group to generate questions that are relevant to your group. To tackle questions and issues that are sources of confusion and opportunities for growth for *your* students.

Confusion: "What does 'atone' mean?" or "Why does 1 John only promise that we might live?" would be good examples of "confusion" questions, but we accidentally already asked those in the book.

Thinking: The passage from Isaiah says that God punished Christ for our sins. I understand that Christ took on our inequity, but *punish* seems pretty intense. Why would a God of love punish his children to begin with?

Being: 1 John tells us that love is not that we have loved God, but that he first loved us. If I am loved before I can even love, what does that tell me about how God sees me? How does this effect the way that I am called to love?

Doing: How can I have "the same mindset as Christ" in my relationships? In what relationships am I being called to deeper sacrificial love?

Going: Romans 5 tells us that Christ died for us "while we were still sinners." How does Christ's example impact the way that we interact with and respond to non-believers or those who sin against us? What is Christ's example?
